Planning your professional learning:

Supporting EAL/D learners when learning from home

EAL/D students learn English, through English and about English at school and the pedagogy to support their learning of both curriculum outcomes and language and literacy outcomes is dependent on both planned and at point of need scaffolding. When planning learning from home for EAL/D students, it is essential that the pedagogy underpinning successful language learning is reflected, as much as possible, in learning from home lessons whether synchronous or asynchronous. This pedagogy includes:

- knowing each EAL/D student's <u>phase of English language proficiency</u> and using this to guide the level and type of support required. For information visit <u>Assessing English</u> <u>language proficiency</u>.
- identifying the language and literacy demands as well as any assumed cultural and conceptual knowledge underlying the curriculum and texts used in class programs. This should be relative to each student and their assessed phase of English language proficiency.
- 3. carefully planning the appropriate scaffolding required for both language and literacy learning as well as developing curriculum content knowledge.

The NSW Department of Education has a <u>Learning from home site</u> designed to support teachers in preparing for remote learning. Advice for supporting <u>EAL/D students learning from home</u> is also available. Resources relating to <u>wellbeing</u>, using <u>technology</u>, programming and <u>professional learning on demand</u> can all be accessed via the learning from home website. <u>Translated information</u> is available for parents and carers who do not speak English well and schools are also encouraged to communicate with parents using the <u>telephone interpreter service</u>.

In addition, the <u>EAL/D NSW statewide staffroom</u> has a dedicated learning from home channel including a files section where members share resources. All teachers of EAL/D learners are welcome to join the EAL/D NSW statewide staffroom.
